



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

About Better Cotton

- We are a multi-stakeholder initiative committed to transforming the cotton sector towards sustainability
- Our top governance body, the Better Cotton Council, is composed of representatives from our Membership – representing producer organisations, brands & retailers, suppliers, civil society, and others
- We currently engage around 2.4 million farmers representing around 25% of the world's cotton

Our mission: "to help cotton communities to survive and thrive, while protecting and restoring the environment."



Better Cotton Strategic Aims for 2030

- Embed sustainable farming practices and policies so that on cotton farms the soil is healthy and land, water and other resources are managed for the good of local communities and the planet.
- Enhance the well-being and economic development of cotton farmers by helping to make cotton farming economically viable for them and their communities, with improved working conditions, good health prospects and a better quality of life.
- Drive the global demand for sustainable cotton throughout its complex supply chains, by making Better Cotton the preferred choice for growers and buyers.

Why does the P&C matter?

- Shifting our >2 million Better Cotton farmers towards more sustainable practices drives significant environmental and social impacts at farm level, and helps mainstream better practices
- As a multistakeholder platform: multitude of interests and ambitions from different stakeholders
- Indicators in the P&C play a key role in focusing resources and funding from Better Cotton and Implementing Partners

Top down – what does science tell us? What is needed to make cotton production significantly more sustainable?



Bottoms up – what do farmers, workers, and cotton communities need?
What is feasible to ask them to do?





Example - PPE

- Current P&C introduced a new, mandatory requirement for smallholder farmers to use Personal Protective Equipment
- Focus is on covering specific body parts, but without prescribing specific types of PPE
- Implementation remains challenging, but we have seen significant gains in awareness and use of protective equipment














Why a revision?

- We believe in continuous improvement not only for Better Cotton Farmers, but for ourselves as well
- In line with codes of good practice for voluntary standards, we periodically review the Better Cotton P&C
- This is a way for us to:
 - Keep up with innovative agricultural and social practices, and the latest scientific and technological research
 - Ensure the P&C continue to meet best practice, are effective and locally relevant
 - Align with Better Cotton's 2030 strategy










Project Governance Structure





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Overview of key changes being discussed

- Simplify and streamline the document, link it to more regional- specific guidance
- Shifting focus from planning requirements towards actions and outcomes
- Embrace a farmer-centric approach
- Continued focus on Continuous Improvement, but with more local relevance
- Merge Soil/Water/ Biodiversity
- Strengthen focus and visibility of climate change and livelihoods

Spotlight on selected proposed changes

© Climate Change:

- New dedicated 'Climate Action' subsection under Management
- Dedicated symbol for all mitigation/ adaptation indicators under other Principles (e.g., irrigation efficiency)
- Introducing a climate-change risk assessment (at regional or landscape level) to inform field activities

Natural Resources

- Merging soil, water, biodiversity into a holistic approach
- Strengthened focus on regenerative and climate-smart agriculture
- Stronger links to local guidance on recommended best practices
- Re-thinking biodiversity mapping stronger links to management actions, and reduced time/ resource





Spotlight on selected proposed changes

Livelihoods


- Stronger focus on supporting financial wellbeing of smallholder farmers
- Likely flexible approach based on consulting with local farmers to understand priorities and then implementing relevant action plans
- Measures could include e.g.
 - greater support for Producer Organisations/ cooperatives
 - improving access to market
 - access to credit
 - new diversified income sources, etc.

Decent Work

- Proposing to shift towards an 'assess and address' approach for risks of child labor, forced labour, and discrimination
 - Focus on Implementing Partners having effective systems to monitor & address labour risks
- Strengthened requirements on health and safety and sanitation
- Explicit focus on supporting women farmers and workers
- New expectations around grievance mechanisms and access to remediation – but with a delayed implementation timeline





Do you generally agree with the proposed direction of the changes?






Which 3 key areas would you prioritise in the Revision?




