Background

We are seeking a consultant(s) or organisation to support Better Cotton in the design and pilot of a Labour Monitoring and Remediation system in Nampula and Niassa, Mozambique.






Better Cotton has been grown in Mozambique since 2013, primarily in the regions of Nampula and Niassa. Today, close to half of the country's circa 200,000 cotton farmers are committed to producing Better Cotton in line with our farm-level standard or "Principles & Criteria". Most households have small plots, typically less than one hectare of rain-fed cotton, which they cultivate largely by hand. The majority of smallholder farmers in Mozambique cultivate cotton as a cash crop, next to, or in rotation with their subsistence food crops, to secure extra income.

Poverty in Mozambique is widespread, with more than 50% of the population living below the poverty line. It is particularly concentrated in rural areas, where farming is the main economic activity. While cotton provides an important source of income for farmers, smallholder cotton farmers struggle to meet their household needs. Underscored by poverty, the challenges related to decent work at farm level are salient and widespread.

In developing and piloting a Labour Monitoring and Remediation system, Better Cotton and its partners aim to improve community engagement on farm-level labour practices and access to remedy for farming communities, including through targeted interventions to tackle the prevalent challenges such as child labour, occupational health and safety issues, and others - as identified through local risk mapping and prioritisation.

The introduction of a Labour Monitoring and Remediation system corresponds to Better Cotton farm standard's new requirements applicable across Producer categories (Smallholder – SH; Medium Farms – MF; and Large Farms – LF) 5.1.1, 5.1.2 and 5.1.3, which provide that:



As with all Better Cotton standard's criteria, implementation needs to be translated into the local context, with creative approaches and solutions that are locally relevant, participatorily-designed and community owned, while still meeting the criteria's overarching intent.

Scope of Work

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The scope of this consultancy includes the following – subject to final adjustments that will be decided in agreement with the selected consultant(s) or organisation:



- Engagement with Better Cotton and its Programme Partners to build a clear understanding of the purpose and objectives of this pilot project, as well as key expectations.
- Lead and design in-person, Focus Group Discussions (FGDs) in Nampula and Niassa, with the objectives to:
 - o Co-design a locally owned and context-relevant labour monitoring and remediation approach with Programme Partners, including relevant field staff (PU managers; field facilitators) and participatory engagement from farming communities, with adequate representation of women's and youth's perspectives. The discussions should also include other local / community / government stakeholders, as mapped and relevant.
 - o Agree on relevant roles and responsibilities in operationalising the system, including with respect to data collection and monitoring of farm labour; grievance handling; remediation and support to address the issues identified.
 - o Agree on relevant interventions to support remediation or mitigation of prevalent issues, and how they will be actioned, including those most affected by the identified risks and those who can be part of their resolution.
- Document the co-designed approach, including by outlining the responsibilities agreed to and assigned, as well as the remediation protocols. Translate this approach into accessible (visual) training and communication materials for communities and field staff involved in the pilot.
- Deliver in-person training and share developed materials with relevant Programme Partner staff and community members on the approach.
- Support baseline data collection, as per agreed approach with particular emphasis on understanding who is working (labour profiles: gender; age; type of worker etc.); on what tasks; and under what conditions.
- Support analysis of baseline data collected to inform prioritised interventions on mitigation and remediation activities.
- Support actioning of mitigation and remediation activities, as prioritised.
- Document results and learnings from piloted LMR approach, including successes and challenges – with recommendations for improvement. Share and discuss these with Better Cotton and its Programme Partners.
- Drawing on pilot learnings and needs expressed by Better Cotton and its Programme Partners, support the development of locally adapted guidance materials on the set-up of an effective LMR system in Mozambique, including step-wise actions/activities to be undertaken; good practices, recommendations and lessons learnt (do's and don'ts); as well as concrete examples. Support also the pre-season training sessions organized by Better Cotton's Mozambique staff, with specific reference to the LMR roll-out process.
